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
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

On behalf of myself and SE Network SafetyNet at Boys & Girls Clubs of King County (BGCKC), we would like to take this opportunity to share the importance and impact of Rainier Beach: A Beautiful Safe Place for Youth (RBABSPY). The mission of Boys & Girls Clubs of King County is to, inspire and enable young people who need us the most, to realize their full potential as a productive, responsible, and caring citizens. However, we recognize that some youth need specialized, non-traditional programming and services to reach their full potential so we have the SE Network SafetyNet Program in collaboration with community partners to provide a SafetyNet of specialized programming and services to youth and families in Southeast Seattle. These services work to buffer the consequences of the many risk factors that pull our youth away from Academic Success, Good Character and Citizenship and Healthy Lifestyles.

We are a proud founding member of the RBABSPY Initiative which is a place-based, community-led and data driven approach to addressing crime that affects youth at "hot spots" in the Rainier Beach neighborhood. Our model combines guardianship, youth and neighborhood engagement, crime prevention through environmental design (CPTED), community-wide restorative justice, and positive behavioral interventions and supports (PBIS). These innovative, non-arrest interventions have been making a difference and have contributed to a reduction in violent crime within Rainier Beach. SE Network at BGCKC leads the Safe Passage and Community-Wide Restorative Justice work in the Rainier Beach neighborhood. Safe Passage is a non-arrest intervention that provides guardianship in the neighborhood by caring adults from the community. Our Community-Wide Restorative Justice work has been implemented in the Rainier Beach community through holding peace/healing circles for youth, parents, and community members, peace/healing circle keeper trainings, and community engagement events implemented for hot spot remediation. Both intervention strategies have not only contributed to crime reduction, but also to changing the feel and culture of the neighborhood by creating an environment of healing and safe space for community members to grieve and know that their community cares for them.

The collective efforts and commitment of all of our RBABSPY partners in this work, the Rainier Beach community, our funders, and supporters have greatly contributed to the success of this Initiative and we are proud to be a part of it.

On behalf of the Seattle University Crime & Justice Research Center, I offer this letter of support for the *Rainier Beach*: A Beautiful Safe Place for Youth (ABSPY). The Seattle University Crime & Justice Research Center took over the work that has been done by George Mason University evaluating the Rainier Beach ABSPY initiative since 2012.

The Seattle University Crime & Justice Research Center evaluation of the Rainier Beach ABSPY continues the work of George Mason University to collect data on crime and calls for service and community perceptions of public safety in Seattle's Rainier Beach neighborhood incorporating the addition of Community-Police Dialogues facilitated with Rainier Beach youth and adults. The goal of this project is to evaluate the Rainier Beach ABSPY initiative through data on community perception of public safety and crime and calls for service in Seattle's Rainier Beach neighborhood. Our research team is comprised of two faculty members (me and Dr. Matthew Hickman) and four student research analysts who work with the Core Rainier Beach ABSPY Core team to integrate our research efforts with the Rainier Beach ABSPY work in the Rainier Beach Community.

The Seattle University Crime & Justice Research Center also collaborates on the Seattle Police Department's (SPD) Micro-Community Policing Plans (MCPP) comprising the annual Seattle Public Safety Survey and Community-Police Dialogues. Our involvement in both the evaluation of the Rainier Beach ABSPY initiative and the SPD MCPP offers an opportunity to connect the work we have done over the past ten years with the SPD MCPP with the important work that has been done and that continues through the Rainier Beach ABSPY. The Rainier Beach ABSPY is an extraordinary example of what can be done within one Seattle neighborhood to utilize crime and community perception data about public safety in coordination with ongoing work being done within and in collaboration between community organizations, city departments, businesses, and residents working together for a safer community. Our city is fortunate to have the *Rainier Beach ABSPY* initiative as an example of what can be done in every neighborhood in Seattle to increase public safety and improve neighborhood quality of life.

It is an honor to partner with *Rainier Beach ABSPY*. On behalf of our research team, we look forward to continued partnership that will enable our local team to work with the *Rainier Beach ABSPY* to continue to expand and improve the work being done through initiative to show how community members can work together with community and city agencies to increase public safety in ways that benefit both Rainier Beach and the entire city by offering a stellar example about what can be done in any neighborhood within any city to make the world a better place.

Dear Rainier Beach Community Member,

As part of the Restorative Practices (RP) Team in Seattle Public Schools under Coordinated School Health, it has been an honor to serve on the Rainier Beach: A Safe Beautiful Place for Youth Core Team since 2016. I was invited to share some reflections of this past year as it relates to the work within district and schools in our collective efforts to create safe, welcoming, and just environments where all students feel a deep sense of belonging, are valued, learn, and thrive. In this Look Back Letter, I'd like to thank and highlight the Rainier Beach Community-based organizations, school teams, educators, families and students for their ongoing commitment and dedication to improving the safety, supports and success of Rainier Beach neighborhood schools in care, partnership and service of students and youth.

Community of Practice Events

This year, the SPS Restorative Practices Team continued partnering with WA-Bloc, Huayruro and other Community Partners to host four Community of Practice Events to provide opportunities for educators, administrators, and community partners to build community, sit in circle and strengthen school-based restorative practices. We listened, shared ideas, built connections and cultivated a relational space to come together and learn with and from one another. We started this school year with a shared vision statement harvested from the previous year's Community of Practice events. This statement aimed to capture the words and ideas from the SPS Community to communicate the hope in what will be achieved through a restorative practices approach in SPS.

Community Vision for Restorative Practices in SPS

Seattle Public Schools are at the heart of the city. SPS Restorative Practices empowers school communities and centers students' wellness and joy in learning and in life. We engage in a relational and healing-centered process to foster community connectedness, combat the harms of systemic racism, and cultivate racially just, equitable, and inclusive schools. We are a community that celebrates our individual and shared humanity.

Shared Training Events and Resources

To support our district and school-based community teams' work toward that vision, our team created an SPS Restorative Practices Website to build common definitions and understanding, a shared place to elevate and acknowledge community partners, a calendar of events, celebrate and highlight school successes, and links to registration for professional development:

SPS Restorative Practices Program Website

The SPS RP Team worked in partnership with members of the Department of Racial Equity Advancement and Health Education to offer bi-monthly training opportunities for school teams that included restorative circles.

1) Restorative Practices 101: Fundamentals of Circles - These sessions covered the core philosophy and history of Restorative Practices. Sharing key elements of circle practice allowed Educators to walked away ready for Tier 1 Community Building circles in classrooms. 2) The Seattle TFI: Cultivating an Equitable and Restorative Culture and Climate – These PD sessions aimed to build community and orient teams to the Seattle-Tiered Fidelity Inventory (Sea-TFI) within a restorative circle process. This experience and guiding tool offered a process through an antiracist and equity focused lens for teams to examine and improve current systems and practices through a co-design model toward an equity-first framework for safe, just, and joyful school.

2023-2024 SPS, Rainier Beach Schools and Community Highlights

- 20th Annual Back 2 School Bash on August 24th a community event celebrating and preparing the young scholars of Rainier Beach packed with fun, food, backpack giveaways, and school supplies.
- Back to School Days for SPS Staff Dunlap's Pride Team and SPS RP Team elevated a restorative approach through community building circles with the whole staff exploring themes around equity and belonging.
- Fall 2023 WA-BLOC, SPS RP Team, Wing Luke and Emerson Faculty engaged in restorative circles, networking and collaboration elevating a restorative approach and building community.
- African American Males Achievement (AAMA) 9th Grade Quarterly Awards Assembly, RBHS Little Theatre
- WA-BLOC Circle Keeper, Keisha Kelley, engaged with Emerson 4th and 5th Grade Students in an eight-week Restorative Practices Leadership Series graduating young circle keepers.
- Rainier Beach High School hosted The Seattle Black College Expo November 4, 2023, in partnership between Seattle Public Schools and the National College Resource Foundation (NCRF) with 50 HBCUs
- Rainier Beach, Dunlap, South Shore, Emerson, MLK, Jr continued efforts to build community and support educators and students through restorative practices and circle keeping.
- Rainier Beach Community Center housed this year's Childcare Community Alignment Summit that included SEL and Restorative Practices Team members aligning with childcare providers elevating SEL and RP

Intervention Partners

In addition to the Core Team partners, leadership and critical support of ABSPY non-arrest interventions are provided by community partners, including South East Effective Development (SEED), the Rainier Beach Merchants Association, Seattle Public Schools, and many others.

Community Task Force (CTF)

The Community Task Force (CTF) consisted of approximately 125 community members who represented the diversity of the Rainier Beach neighborhood. CTF members live, work, or go to school near the five focus areas and worked in Hotspot Teams. The CTF met over a nine-month period in 2013-14. Their goal was to determine the conditions that contributed to youth crime at the five hotspot locations. Finally, they identified non-arrest interventions.



DETECTIVE COOKIE CHESS PARK


In 2006, Seattle Police Detective Denise "Cookie" Bouldin started a chess club for Rainier Beach youth. The game served well as a metaphor for life's important decisions. Since then, Detective Cookie's chess club has provided a safe haven and created an opportunity for neighbors of all ages to interact and build community.

To honor Det. Cookie and to carry forth the positive momentum of her work, a group of community leaders and volunteers formed the Friends of Det. Cookie Chess Park (FDCCP) and began work on a permanent chess park and community gathering space.









CRIME PREVENTION THROUGH ENVIRONMENTAL DESIGN (CPTED) & YOUTH NEIGHBORHOOD ENGAGEMENT (YNE) 2023

"Neighborhood pearls" are what crime prevention researchers and practitioners refer to as "hotspots". Residents in Rainier Beach preferred the asset-based term of pearls rather than use the term hotspots.



The pearls being activated in Rainier Beach are: the RB Light-Rail station area, Rainier & Henderson, Rose Street and Rainier, Lake WA Apartments (Mapes Creek Walkway at 52nd Ave South and Henderson), Rainier and Seward Park Avenue and Hutchinson Park. These locations are known to have high incidences that contribute to youth crime and therefore are primarily where we choose to activate.

'Activations' are how we choose to impact these spaces. By having pop-up neighborhood events that promote community safety we take up the space and change the environment to be more positive. Activations are a space where resources, information and nutrition can be distributed to the neighborhood. It could be either a flier for an upcoming town hall, job-fair, community event or even the back2school Bash.

This form of engagement is essential for keeping the community informed on local events.

The primary goal is to develop a following of neighborhood volunteers (residents, businesses, youth, families, and organizations) to provide stewardship of the pearls and engagement at the geographic focus area, a space they live, work and/or play in.

Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design (CPTED)

is a crime prevention methodology where physical improvement in public spaces occurs including storefront improvements of small businesses designed to increase safety and improve marketability.

The four levels of CPTED

- Level 1 Litter pickup of the areas, a great activity for volunteers
- Level 2 Find it, Fix it reporting of issues like illegal dumping, graffiti, damaged signs etc.(A City of Seattle Service request app).
- Level 3 Cleanup of debris, blackberries and leaves across sidewalks, trimming bushes in public right of ways
- Level 4 Planting flowers, installing signs, creating community volunteer projects, installing benches or other high level activities.


